Guy Fawkes verbrannt

Freundeskreis Crawley frönte einer alten Sitte

DORSTEN • Dem Attentatsversuch des englisch-katholischen Offiziers Guy Fawkes im Jahre 1605 verdankte der Dorstener Freundeskreis Crawley einen gemütlichen Abend im „Wacholderhäuschen“.

Jedes Jahr wird am 5. November beinahe im gesamten Commonwealth die „Bonfire Night“ gefeiert. 13 Verschwörer versuchten an diesem Tag, mit 36 Fässern Schießpulver bei der Eröffnung des Parlaments in London dieses in die Luft zu jagen. Durch Verrat einer der Mitverschwörer wurde Guy Fawkes, der zur Bewachung der Fässer im Keller des Parlaments abgestellt war, ergriffen, die Verschwörung aufgedeckt. Die spontanen Freudenfeuer der Londoner Bevölkerung, die an diesem 5. November 1605 loderten, haben seitdem Tradition. Traditionell wird auch an diesem Abend eine Guy Fawkes-Puppe dem Feuer übergeben.

Der Freundeskreis spielte im Innenhof die entscheidenden Szenen dieser Nacht durch. Marita Kipinski, 1. Vorsitzende des Vereins, spielte mit Bart und Fass zum ersten Mal Guy Fawkes, der um die 50 Teilnehmer schlich - während der gebürtige Engländer Philip Ralph, der aus

Crawley stammt und seit über 20 Jahren in Dorsten wohnt, als Bischof von London verkleidet und mit den Insignien seines Amtes in getragenerm Englisch die Geschichte der Verschwörung vortrug. Das Schauspiel am Feuer, das im Innenhof des „Wacholderhäuschen“ entzündet wurde, endete wie es jedes Jahr in dieser Nacht endet: Guy Fawkes wird verraten, der Sergeant at Arms - gespielt von Maurice Pilz -

ergreift den Attentäter auf frischer Tat. Symbolisch wurde dann die Guy Fawkes-Puppe

verbrannt. Statt eines Feuerwerks, das bei der „Bonfire Night“ gezündet wird, erhellten Wunderkerzen den Abend. Einziger Wehmutstropfen war, dass der Parkin-Cake, der an diesem Abend gegessen wird, nicht gereicht werden konnte. Marita Kipinski, die den Kuchen gebacken hatte, verkalkulierte sich: Der Kuchen braucht eine Reifungszeit von zwei Wochen. Das tat aber der guten Stimmung keinen Abbruch. » hpk

Burning of Guy Fawkes

The Guy Fawkes Night or Bonfire Night on the evening of 5 November to mark the failure of the Gunpowder Plot of 5 November 1605 was remembered by the Dorsten Twinning Association in "Wacholderhauschen" in Dorsten.

This occasion is remembered every year and traditionally the Guy Fawkes effigy is burned on bonfire, The Dorsten Twinning Committee enacts the story during this night. For the first time Marita Kipinski the chairwoman of the association played the character of Guy Fawkes. Philip Ralph who originates from England and lives in Dorsten for over 20 years, performed the role of the Bishop of London and told the story. The story ends as every year by betrayal of Guy Fawkes. The Sergeant at Arms played by Maurice Pilz - catches the plotter. Guy Fawkes will then be symbolically burned on the bonfire. Marita Kipinski has baked the traditional Parkin cake which is normally eaten at this evening, however Marita has miscalculated the 2 weeks for storage period required before the cake is ready to eat. However this has not spoiled the wonderful atmosphere of the night.
