Dear Members and Friends,

Welcome to the late Spring 2023 edition of the CTTA Newsletter. I am pleased to report that after almost over two and half of very quiet years for the CTTA due to the pandemic restrictions, the committee has now restarted the association's regular meetings and activities.

In December 2022 we held our first AGM since 14.01.2020. MAKING friends with like-minded people is a part of joining most clubs. But friendship is the very reason Craw-

ley's Town Twinning Association was launched 25 years ago.

Its aim to foster friendship between the people of Crawley and those of Dorsten in Germany.

And for the 70 plus members of the association international friendship is the key to its success.

Once every two years a group of 35 club members visit Crawley's twin town to spend a week as guests of Dorsten families Association secretary Iris Orriss explained: "People make lifelong friendships through these visits."

On alternate years a group from Dorsten comes to Crawley and stay as guests with members.

There are also regular visits by the Mayor and civic officials from both towns and several Crawley groups organise their own exchange visits with their German counterparts.



The 750th anniversary of Dorsten

Dorsten - 750th Anniversary celebrations June 2001

Do you remember that wonderful spell of weather we had in May? Despite my 70 odd years, as soon as a heatwave comes I can't imagine anything but sunshine – and so it was that I set off to Dorsten



(as a privileged hanger-on to the Chairman) in the lightest of gear with a couple of dresses packed- no raincoat, no anorak even! We were sharing the car with Jackie and Geoff (excellent travelling companions) and had a trouble-free trip, arriving at Marita's in Dorsten by 4pm, where the skies were a little cloudier and the wind fresh.

Usual alcohol-laden cake and rumbustious conversation at Marita's, then Ken and I departed for our hosts in Wulfen. We found the house by driving round in circles for half-an-hour or so (Wulfen is rather like Broadfield in that respect) and were treated to asparagus and strawberries for supper – no self-respecting German would offer anything else at that time of year!

Saturday morning was billed as a formal reception by the Mayor and a talk on citizenship. Dorsten has many twin towns, in Israel, Nicaragua, Poland, France, Germany, Northern Ireland and ourselves and they had all sent representatives. Some how our Town Council, which had received the official invitation, interpreted it as a trip for councillors only, but our excellent friends on the Dorsten committee, by threatening not to come unless we did, had managed to squeeze out invitations for us. In between the more serious items on the agenda a superb jazz trio played, and after a ceremony reaffirming Dorsten's commitment to its friendship with all the towns we went on to a buffet provided by a local catering college. (I won't tell you about the giant prawns - the smoked salmon - the champagne ...)

That evening saw the opening of the Altstadt Fest – beer and wine drinking in the town square to the music of a pop band – ideally in warm evening sunshine. By the time we arrived the drizzle had started, but we were cheered by meeting Victor and

'Froggy' Wood (in her best dirndl) who had come over from Munich for the weekend so we huddled around the French stall with its champagne and red wine from the two twin towns.

On Saturday our chairman went off to a seminar on which he will report, while I did a little light shopping in the blustery rain. We had been asked to translate some prayers into English and in the evening found they were part of an ecumenical service at the beginning of a social in one of the local schools – every prayer translated into all the languages represented. Then a great surprise – the social took off with a performance of Appalachian clog-style dancing from the Crawley group Hi-Jinx. We felt so proud of them as they strutted and rattled their way through the catchy dancetunes and were enthusiastically cheered. Then came a Polish orchestra and a French windband – and home in the rain.

By Sunday the winds were coming straight from Siberia. A tent had been put up in the Town Centre with publicity photos of visits to and from all the twin towns, and was flapping and threatening to take off. A kind friend wrapped me in half of

her pashmina and we were rushed off to lunch. The final event was a splendid dinner in a local hotel where we met some of the Israeli and Polish deputations and then went on to a concert given



by the Dorsten music-school and the Polish orchestra. Then out onto the terrace overlooking the canal where, wrapped in car-blankets and any available rain-gear, we watched the fireworks swooping up over the town and bringing the 750th anniversary celebrations to an end. To make sure we slept our hostess brought us all woolly socks and tracksuits and we had a few final glasses before falling into bed.

Needless to say, as we entered Dover harbour, the sky cleared, the sun came out and English summer weather (for once) welcomed us home.
